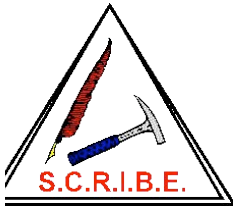

## Mineral of the Month

### Goethite

An ore for iron that is not commonly known is Goethite. It is hydrogen iron oxide,  $\text{FeO}(\text{OH})$ , with Fe being 62.9%, O, 27%, and  $\text{H}_2\text{O}$  is 10.1%. Manganese is often found in small amounts with Goethite. The crystal family is orthorhombic but is rarely found in crystals and generally found as massive forms in plates and is called "bog ore" because it's found loose. It has a hardness of 5 to 5 1/2 and a specific gravity of 4.37 but may be as low as 3.3. Goethite has a dull luster and is yellow-brown to dark brown in color. The streak is yellow-brown. It can be found with other minerals, such as: quartz, calcite, magnate, limonite, and psilomelane. In fact, Goethite was confused with limonite until positive identification was discovered by using X-rays.

The name of the mineral is in honor of Johann Wolfgang von Goethe, a German poet and amateur mineralogist. Goethite is generally a secondary mineral and occurs in a weathering condition and results from being a precipitate. For example, we have iron minerals that have ground or surface waters running through them. The iron is brought into solution by carbonic acids then moved by the water to areas of no water movement, as marshes and ponds. The water evaporates and the carbonate changes into an oxide and is reduced. It gathers as a scum on the surface of the water then forms impure concentrates of the mineral. After the pools or streams disappear the mineral is recovered as "Bog-Iron Ore."

Goethite is found in the U.S. commonly near Lake Superior, in iron-bearing limestone in the Appalachian Mountains. Fine crystals occur in quartz in Colorado. In Europe, it's found as an ore in Westphalia, Bohemia, and Cornwall, England.

**Saturday, April 19, 2008, 9:30 Am  
Chunky Gal Mtn., Corundum Knob  
Clay County, North Carolina  
NO FEE**

**WHERE:** Corundum Knob (also known as Chunky Gal Knob), Clay County, NC.

**WHEN:** 9:30 AM, April 19, 2008

**COLLECTING:** Ruby corundum (pink to red), Spinel (black to brown "galaxite" and magnesio-chromite), Sapphirine, Talc, Serpentine, Brucite (white to blueish chalky chunks), Tremolite, Actinolite, Smaragdite (chrome-emerald green amphibole), Pyroxine (chrome diopside/sparse green micro-crystals of weathered amphibolite matrix), Fuchsite and Dunite.

**BRING:** If you wish to screen sediments (this is "blind mining") for home washing/tumbler cleaning, you will need shovels, 3-5 gallon buckets or 2-3 gallon plastic bags (like those from the market), 1/4 inch (6mm) screens, hand shovels, gloves, and goggles. Most of the above minerals will be found this way. If you wish to collect smaragdite with ruby, sledge hammers, chisels, 3-5 gallon buckets, gloves and goggles (eye protection) will be needed. Please make sure your "tetanus" shots are up to date. Please wear boots/hiking shoes. This is tick country so check yourself especially if you dress lightly. Sprays with "DEET" are recommended. Watch out for snakes, because this is rattlesnake country. **DO NOT STEP OR PUT YOUR HANDS WHERE YOU CANNOT SEE!**

**DIRECTIONS:** At the intersection of US-64 and US-441 (southwest of Franklin, Macon County, NC), interested parties/individuals will take US-64 west (toward Murphy, NC) to the Buck Creek Road turnoff (north). All field trip/DMC members will meet here, because the entrance to Chunky Gal is unmarked. The Buck Creek Road turnoff is 17.5 miles west of Franklin, NC. In accordance with SFMS/DMC rules, all participants must meet at the meeting site, and then we will proceed to Chunky Gal, which is one mile further west on the road. This is a "free site" for collecting in the Nantahala National Forest, BUT DO NOT DIG ANY DEEPER THAN 18 INCHES, under Nantahala National Forest Rules (Chunky Gal has been designated as a "rockhound collecting site).

**ACCOMMODATIONS:** Franklin, NC is the best bet for lodging and restaurants, especially on US-441, US-64, NC-28.

James Bowers Limonite Prospect Field

Aquadale, NC

**FEE AREA**

**WHERE:** James Bowers Limonite Prospect Field at Aquadale, NC

**WHEN:** 9:00 AM, May 17, 2008

**COLLECTING:** Various size limonite pseudomorphs after pyrite cubes. The larger cubes, possibly up to 2 and 1/2 inches, are still in matrix. You can surface collect and find smaller cubes up to an inch or more. You can also dig down several feet and find the larger cubes and some bigger clusters.

**FEE:** The fee ( **\$10.00 per adult / children 12 or younger are free** ) is to be paid to Arthur (Bud) Oates as you enter the mining site since this is a fee based mine. You will also have to sign an entrance form which will free the High Point Mineral Club from any mining liability just as you normally do at most other mining sites.

**BRING:** Bring picks, shovels, and other tools that you would use to dig into the ground. It is not rocky until you hit the matrix rock. Then you will need your picks. Gloves are a must. You will have to walk about a 0.5 mile into the mining area from where you park following a clear cut gas line which is usually well maintained. Pine trees now grow on the once open field. Bring water and food with you. There are no places to purchase food and drink near by the mining site. There are no bathrooms but there are trees etc. Also, suggest a change of clothes and shoes/boots since you will be working in red clay soil. You must fill in your holes before leaving and pick up all your trash.

**DIRECTIONS:** From I-85 take hwy. 52 south to Albemarle, NC. Continue south of Albemarle on highway 52 approximately 10 miles to SR1918 (Cotton Mill Rd) and turn right. This road is just south of Porter, NC at the sign for North Stanley High School. Keep left at fork shortly thereafter. Continue straight on Cotton Mill Rd/SR1918 passing a junior high school on your left and you will shortly come to a traffic circle. Turn left on this circle and you will see the Michelin Tire Plant on your left and the North Stanley High School on your right. Turn left into the tire plant and park far left of the chain link fence in a right of way found there. There will be some one present to guide you into the mining site. I recommend that you familiarize yourself with the area by using mapquest maps or the like. If you get lost you may contact me at 336-314-1248. I will have my cell phone on that morning.

**NOTE:** Park on a right of way to the left of the Michelin Tire Plant. Do not park where there are no parking signs. Your vehicle may be towed away at your expense. You may, of course, park along the state highway. There is really no good entrance to this mining area.
