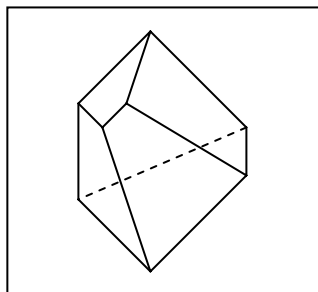
## A Story About Everybody

## MINERAL OF THE MONTH

### CINNABAR



When you see a good specimen of Cinnabar you will see why it is a prized mineral. When pure crystals are exhibited, they are a beautiful bright red. The cherry red color shows it's pure but when impurities are present, it will be brownish red. The hardness is 2 ½ and a heavy 8.1 specific gravity.

The chemical formula, HgS, shows us it's a sulfide of Mercury. The prismatic crystals are in the Hexagonal crystal system and in the crystal class, Triagonal-trapezohedral. The crystals are usually rhombohedral. Clay, iron oxide (rust), and bitumen are the most often impurities to be found in Cinnabar. Mercury comprises 86.2% of the mineral and Sulfur, 13.8%.

Cinnabar should be handled very carefully because of the Mercury that could be present in its natural liquid state, and it's poison to man and creature. When Cinnabar is heated slowly, Mercury is released. A caution should be observed of washing hands very thoroughly when handling the mineral.

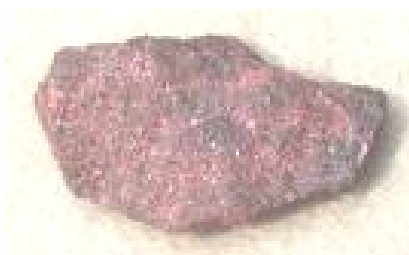
Cinnabar is the prime source of Mercury and is found in relatively few areas with enough quantity to be of any economic value. It occurs in sedimentary rocks near volcanically active regions and hot springs. It occurs in near-surface deposits near what were probably once alkaline rich pools.

Cinnabar has been found with veins of sulfides of copper in association with opal, quartz, barite, calcite, and fluorite. It is also found with stibnite, marcasite, and pyrite.

Localities where Cinnabar is found are Spain, Italy, Peru, and China. The location in Almaden, Spain probably has the best mineral specimens. In the U.S. Cinnabar can be found in California, Nevada, Utah, Oregon, Arkansas, Idaho, and Texas.

The origin of the name probably comes from India, where it is used as a resin.

This information was gathered from *Dana's Manual of Mineralogy* and *The Audubon Society Field Guide to North American Rocks and Minerals*.

The Southern Appalachian Mineral Society would like to extend an invitation to rockhounds to visit one of the premier quartz collecting localities in the southeast. The Diamond Hill Mine has been producing skeletal, amethyst and smoky quartz crystals as well as quartz scepters and an assortment of pegmatite minerals for many years. Come join us!

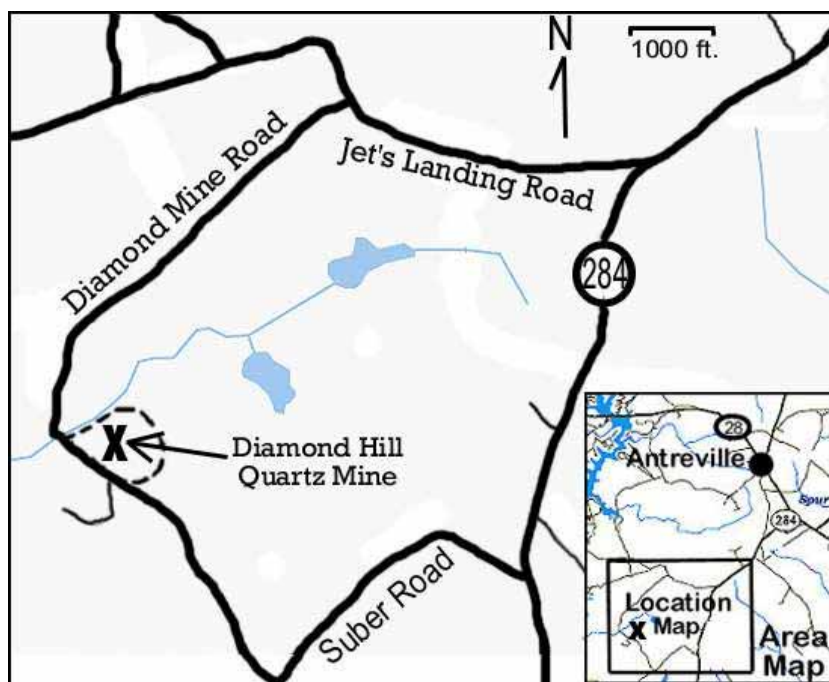
Assembly Point: Diamond Hill Mine

Directions: The Diamond Hill Mine is located near the small town of Antreville in northeastern South Carolina. From the south: Exit I-20 at US 221 (exit # 183) just east of Augusta, Georgia. Drive north on US 221 to McCormick, SC. In McCormick turn north onto SR 28. Continue north on SR 28 toward Antreville (approx. 50 miles). About 2 miles south of Antreville, SR 184 enters SR 28 from the left (west). When you pass SR 184 start watching carefully on the left for Emanuel Baptist Church. Turn left at the church onto SR 284. Drive west on SR 284 for 2.3 miles watching carefully on the right for Suber Road (S-0 1 -508). Turn right onto Suber Road and follow it approx. 0.7 mile to Diamond Hill Road ( on right, gravel, S-I-538). Turn right onto Diamond Hill Road and follow it about 0.5 miles. The mine entrance will be on the right.

**Fees:** Adults = \$15/day Children under 16 year of age = \$5/day. Also, upon arrival, each participant will be required to sign a waiver of liability.

Bring: Pick and shovel, rock hammer, chisels, and scratching tools. There is ample water on site for screening and washing specimens. Bring a lunch, plenty of fluids, hat, sunscreen, gloves, and sturdy shoes. Bring rubber boots and a change of cloths if it is going to be a rainy or wet day. Please be prepared for hot and humid conditions at the mine during this time of year.

The Henderson County Gem and Mineral Society will be hosting a trip to the famous Crabtree Emerald Mine on August 16th, 2008. The dig will begin at 9:00 a.m. Saturday morning and continue until dark. The property managers (The M.A.G.M.A. Club) will have a backhoe on site turning over the dump piles to make collecting more productive for those who attend. All who attend will be required to fill out a liability release form upon arrival.

**Collecting:** Emeralds in matrix, emerald crystals, black tourmaline (schorl), garnet, golden beryl, green beryl, fluorite (rare). Cost: \$30.00 per person, children 12 and under are free.

**Facilities:** There will be porta potties on site for the dig.

**Food:** bring food and plenty of water to drink.

**Tools:** Sledge hammers (small and large), 1/4" sifting screen, buckets, shovel.

**Directions:** From Interstate 26 West in Asheville, North Carolina, take Exit 9, Burnsville/Spruce Pine exit, (Hwy.US 19 North), turn right towards Spruce Pine. Drive 25.4 miles to Crabtree Road, turn right, drive 4.7 miles to McKinney Mine Road, turn left, drive 2.3 miles to Chestnut Grove Road, turn left, bear left around the church, drive 1.0 miles to Emerald Mine Road, this road will turn to Gravel, follow 1.2 miles to the mine on the left.

To collect field trip information from it's member societies; schedule and coordinate field trip dates; disseminate field trip information to all member clubs so that each member society may publish this information as one of their "official" scheduled field trips.
